## **Brampton and District 50+ Forum**

Report of the meeting held on Tuesday 31 March 2009 in Brampton Community Centre.

Approximately 24 members were present for lunch and 30 at the meeting. The vice-chair, Ann Oswin, welcomed everyone to the meeting: 'Magistrates in the community'. She then provided information on all the latest news, updates and campaigns.

Ann then introduced our two guest speakers, Linda Moth and Alan Burgess. After each speaker had introduced themselves and given the background of how they had become magistrates, we were given a short quiz to answer in small groups. The questions tested our existing knowledge - in most cases quite limited - about the number of magistrates, the requirements for becoming a magistrate, how often they are required to sit, and their powers. The quiz not only provided factual answers - 48% of the 30000+ magistrates are women, magistrates are not paid but receive expenses, no qualifications are required but there is intensive training, magistrates are required to sit at least 26 times a year, they can impose fines, community service, and custodial sentences up to 6 months - but also provoked many questions from members which provided opportunity for our speakers to recount some anecdotes and to give a personal perspective on local issues.

Ann thanked our guests and the meeting ended with tea.
